

WAVE KNIT SHAWL by Sandra Clarke



This pattern creates wave movement using garter stitch staggered triangles. The triangles naturally form a scalloped bottom which make the waves in this nautical shawl. The seafoam colors add to the marine feel. Please enjoy the pattern. Sandra

Materials

5mm knitting needles (US 8. UK / CAN 6)

Three colors of yarn. 3 oz. skeins of solid colour yarn. Fine (2) weight.

Scissors

Darning needle

INSTRUCTIONS:

Begin by knitting (garter stitch) your first triangle.



Cast on 40 stitches.

Each row is decreased to create a triangle.

Every row is knit in the same manner:

*Slip the first stitch as if to purl,

then move the working yarn to the back so that you can knit the row.

Knit until you reach the last two stitches, then knit the last two stitches together to finish the triangle. *

Turn your work and repeat from * to *

By slip stitching the first stitch as if to purl, you will create a tidy edge in which you will use as a base for more triangles.


Knit two triangles and place the triangles beside each other as per the image below. Pick up 20 stitches from the left side of triangle 1, then pick up 20 stitches from the right side of triangle 2. This will give you 40 stitches which is the base for your next triangle (triangle 3).

Use the same pattern to knit triangle 3 as you did for triangles 1 and 2.

*Slip the first stitch as if to purl,

then move the working yarn to the back so that you can knit the row.

Knit until you reach the last two stitches, then knit the last two stitches together to finish the triangle. *



Picking up the $20 + 20 = 40$ stitches will be easy with the tidy edge you created by slipping the first stitch as if to purl and then bringing the working yarn to the back to continue knitting the row.

The triangles will form a crested wave appearance.

The image below indicates the first 6 triangles in sequence. Once you complete the first 6 triangle waves, you will be able to continue building your shawl as large as you want.






Diagram of first 3 triangle waves.

Knit a 4th triangle and connect it to triangle 2 the same way you connected triangles 1 and 3
